Chieftain Profile: Bill Sauer **Logan's #1 Sports Fan (LHS '32)**

Cerebral Palsy would be a major setback in a normal man's life, but for Bill Sauer it was only the first setback in an amazing life. Born in 1908, Bill wasn't supposed to live past the age of seven. Instead, Bill bested that mark by more than ten times, and became a legend and beloved friend to the people of Logan.

"Passing the same test as everyone else," Bill graduated from Logan High School in 1932. Bill also received an honorary Varsity "L" his senior season for his "unending devotion to all LHS athletic teams." Bill never missed a game or practice during the school year sports of Football, Basketball, and Track and Field.

After his father died in 1946, Bill supported not only himself, but his mother as well by operating a concession stand at the city pool, a small candy store, and by selling Christmas cards and magazine subscriptions.

Bill's smiling face and his specially made motor vehicles became a familiar sight around Logan. During a 35-year stretch, Bill missed only three LHS football games. He became affectionately known as "Logan's Number One Sports Fan." Bill was named Ohio's Handicapped Person of the Year in 1967.

In 1975, the LHS Athletic Field was officially renamed Bill Sauer Field as a tribute to a man who loved to watch "The Purple and White" play ball. As a final tribute, Bill was an inaugural inductee into the LHS Athletic Hall of Fame in 1976.

Tom Armstrong, Chieftain coach in the 1940s wrote, in a letter upon the dedication of the LHS Athletic Field in Bill's name:

"It is altogether proper that the good people of Logan perpetuate the association of Bill Sauer and the Logan football program by memorializing the athletic field in his honor. Bill Sauer's greatest interest was Logan football and as such he became the heart, spirit, and soul of the athletic program. As long as Logan exists, Bill Sauer will still be a part of the life of the community."

Chieftain and Notre Dame gridiron legend Bob McBride remarked that:

"His drive, his words of encouragement and his advice helped every boy whose life he touched in Logan – and there were many of them. He has always worked to make his way in life, and he has been very unselfish with his time and efforts on behalf of other people and his community."

Bill remained a fixture on the purple sidelines – the team would rub his head after coming through the "Tunnel L" - until his death in the late 1980s.



Chieftain Profile: Bob McBride **LHS Class of 1940**

Bob McBride, LHS Class of 1940, is perhaps the greatest football player to ever wear the purple and white. But as strong and powerful as Bob was on the gridiron, his life after football is even more important.

As a senior at Logan HS McBride moved from tackle, where he was an All-League selection as a junior, to fullback where he repeated as an All-SEOAL performer and was named Honorable Mention All-Ohio. While that move is almost unthinkable in today's game, back in the earlier days of football most players were more similar in size and only speed and athleticism determined where you lined up on the field.

McBride captained the 1939 Chieftains, his senior season, to the school's second SEOAL championship. His team started the year 8-0, including six straight shutouts to open the season (all players played both ways in those days). McBride paired with fellow LHS Athletic Hall of Famer Bill "Mutt" Bryan to form a deadly backfield duo.

In one of the greatest games in school history; Logan trailed Middleport, then a southeast Ohio powerhouse, 20-7 late in the fourth quarter in the river city. But McBride completed a pair of long touchdown passes and kicked both extra points in Logan's come-from-behind 21-20 victory. A special train carried hundreds of Logan fans to and from the game and the town celebrated with a party that marched from downtown to the stadium.

Following his graduation from LHS, he went on to play the University of Notre Dame under legendary head coach Frank Leahy. A guard, McBride was a starter for the Fighting Irish but was drafted into military service during World War II following his junior year in South Bend.

As a member of US Army, he served in Europe where he was captured during the Battle of the Bulge and kept captive by the Germans for four months and was forced to march along with Germans as they retreated through the Ardennes forest back to Germany.

McBride, who weighed 210 as a player at ND, shrunk under a starvation diet of one-seventh of a loaf of bread per day. When he was finally rescued by American troops, he weighed just over 90 pounds.

McBride returned home after the war, got himself back into shape, and played his senior season at Notre Dame winning a National Championship in 1946 and captaining Notre Dame in the "Game of the Century" against Army that season.

McBride would go on to coach high school football at Chicago's Mt. Carmel High School, amassing a 16-3 record and later joined Leahy's staff at Notre Dame for five seasons (1949-53) winning a national championship as a coach in '49.

McBride had an extremely successful career in business and at one point accepted the head coaching job with the Los Angeles Chargers before turning it down 24 hours later after he was offered a more lucrative contract to stay in the Midwest.



**Chieftain Profile: Price “Butch”
Kellar and Jerry Crothers
LHS Class of 1977 and 1979**

“Butch” Kellar about his experience as a
player on the 1976 SEOAL championship
football team.*



Champions!

Training camp senior year began with my name on top at offensive center and defensive tackle. Ten years of peewee ball and scout team sacrifice paid my dues. Nobody would keep me from being on the field every minute of every game.

Coach Richardson pulled me aside after two weeks. Through a grimace he explained that the coaches fancied a sophomore named Jerry Crothers. Jerry bench pressed more than me, and outweighed me by 20 pounds. He merited a shot at one of my positions.

Coach asked, “Do you want to play offense or defense?”

I looked him in the eye, “Both.”

"That won't work."

"Defense," I muttered, "it's always better to hit than to receive."

“I thought you liked hitting.”

As Coach turned away, I resolved to win back my spot. Coach Biggers held the final say. He'd play me at center if I made the choice obvious. Jerry's days were about to become difficult.

When the offense practiced, I played scout team noseguard over Jerry. Each time he snapped the ball, I cracked him. Being faster, quicker, and meaner than him put me inside his helmet before he could think. Jerry lost his wind when I found his ribs. I zipped by him without a touch. He listened to me jeer when I broke up a play.

I heard the whispers of our younger teammates. They didn't appreciate my attempts to dismember their buddy. The one time during camp Jerry came out shaken up, I stepped in to snap center. After a few plays, he nodded at Coach to rejoin the fray. The punishment only increased when I thought he backed down, but quitting and Jerry didn't go together. He refused to engage my glare. After each whistle, he got up -- workman like -- and trotted back to the huddle. He aimed to keep the center's job.

Jerry worked on his game. He snapped the ball faster to neutralize my rush. He shot up on pass blocks, and used chop blocks to drop my hands. It stopped being easy to beat him as summer wore on.

One day, I upended him to scramble the offense and make the tackle. As the guys rolled off the pile, I started to gloat. Jerry stood over me with an outstretched hand.

"Good job," he said, as he pulled me to my feet.

I found myself popping up to give him a tug more regularly as camp closed. Jerry got in his licks. He earned his spot as a starter. We wanted to be a great team. Our roster held fine individual players. Something went missing? We lost twice in our first three games, by a total of seven points. We weren't impassioned enough to win. Turmoil brewed in the locker room.

League play opened at home against Ironton. The Tigers owned five successive league championships. They demoralized us the year before. Monday's film session showed them loaded with speed and power on both sides of the ball. Doubts crept in. What were our coaches doing? Why couldn't we have a quarterback change? How could we get more from each other? We gave each other long faces as we passed in the hallways. Ironton scared us!

Tuesday before Ironton, Jerry developed a goose egg over his eye. If it came from my pounding, he wouldn't say. Coach sat him so he'd be ready Friday night. He stormed around, angry about sitting, even though his helmet wouldn't go back on. The seniors whooped it up when Coach sent me in.

Wednesday before Ironton, I dressed early to enjoy a few minutes alone in the stadium. The cheerleaders practiced before the team took the field, and I owned the place to be. The moment glowed as the low sun warmed the air just enough for football weather.

The cheerleaders came around the corner in tears.

"Is it true?"

One of the girls, a friend, leaned into me and cried.

"Somebody on the team died," she sobbed.

My mind raced across the faces on our team picture.

"Who?" I asked.

They didn't know.

Coach Boynton came up. When I saw his red eyes, I surrendered all hopes that the girls were wrong.

"Who, Coach?"

Coach put a big arm around me, and said, "We need to be inside with the team, Butch." Coach Biggers walked to the front of the locker room. On his eye contact the whispers stopped:

"Men, we don't get to call all the plays in life. A few minutes ago, the good Lord took Jerry Crothers to be by his side.

Jerry visited the doctor for that bump on his head. The Doc cleared him to play, but Jerry couldn't practice because he missed school. He washed his motorcycle and took it for a spin to dry. A pickup turned in front of him. The accident killed him instantly.

Pray about this. Answers won't come easily. You will make sense of the pain in time. Go home to your families. They need your strength."

Nobody breathed as the silence mounted. Then a sniff, a sob, and a torrent of emotion flowed. Coach Boynton stayed by me. As the Center and Guard Coach, he applauded my great plays, but he did the same exasperating thing when Jerry stuck me. Coach's arm around me felt good as I tried to rebound.

Part of me felt gone. Jerry pushed me on the field. He stood strong and quiet in the face of my rage -- more mature, even dignified -- about the game I loved. When I pushed him -- he fought with heart and learned from me. I held my breath; afraid to wail when I exhaled. After a minute, Coach Boynton let go of me to check on other guys. We milled around until quiet replaced the sobs. The coaches left us alone.

I crossed the room on numb feet to collapse on the bench by my locker. My helmet sat in my lap. If you play football fearlessly, your helmet shows contact. Most of the purple paint came from collisions with Jerry. Teammates dressed and filtered out while I sat dazed until the room thinned.

When Coach Boynton stuck his head in the locker room, the guys who waited around for me took off. I must have looked pitiful slumped in a practice uniform I never washed wearing a heavy heart. Coach gently pulled up a stool.

We sat a long time, saying nothing. I didn't want to break down. It felt like Coach knew to be still. After a long time, he stood and helped me find the energy to pull my jersey over my head. He popped the clinch on my shoulder pads and gave them a tug. We didn't talk while I dressed into street clothes. Easy words didn't matter. I'm glad he stayed for me.

Coach Boynton finally allowed, "Someday, you will know how many lives you two touched. Competition like you and Jerry shared is a rare thing."

My eyes burned. Coach cried, too.

The administration decided to play Ironton as scheduled, so we practiced in full pads Thursday. When Coach called for the offense, I looked his way, "Who is snapping center?"

"You are, Butch!" Coach Boynton grinned, "You're ready!"

Our defense didn't buckle, but our offense couldn't answer Ironton's thugs. The kid that played over me, confident in his ability to whip a second stringer, pounded my head. We ran out of time and got dumped, 8-0.

The Logan Daily News credited Ironton's noseguard with "getting in on the lion's share of the hits." I wasn't ready. We weren't ready as a team, either. We lost three times in four games, looked heartbroken, and sailed without a rudder in a season nearly half over.

They buried Jerry Saturday. I couldn't bring myself to go. I spent the day riding a horse deep in the Wayne National Forrest. None of my teammates asked why. Missing let me keep an image of Jerry pulling me up with a "you're next" look on his face.

Jerry's equipment sat in his open-faced locker when we came back on Monday. We didn't want it collected. I picked up his headgear to admire its battle scars. Jerry's number, "52" sat where he placed it to start the season. I wondered what gave me the right to do it, and then I peeled the numbers and stuck them on the back of my helmet.

As I sat in the stadium waiting for the team, I ran my thumb over Jerry's numbers. I committed to play the rest of the season as if Jerry and I played together.

Coach Biggers gathered us on Tuesday to ask each of us in turn to pledge to be the last man standing. We adopted the new work ethic. Our season turned on immediate outcomes, beginning with 3 and 1 Jackson, and we knew it.

Jackson let us score early before our offense sputtered. Our defense shut them down. Momentum favored neither team as we headed to the halftime locker room, ahead 6-0. We needed to want to win. The Jackson quarterback we dominated in the first half returned the second half kickoff for a touchdown. We staggered through three plays and a punt with our opening possession.

Coach Biggers replaced our senior quarterback with junior Scott Gasser. Scotty could throw a football through a rolling tire forty yards away. We liked Scott's confidence because he used it in a humble way. The huddle sizzled as he ran out and ducked in to call a play. Excitement surged as I bent over the ball for the center snap.

"Hut!" he yelled.

I hiked it, and then the crowd screamed. I blew the snap. Jackson red recovered the fumble. Three plays later we were down 14-6, to a lesser team. With five minutes to go in the third-quarter, our history threatened to interfere with our destiny.

After we received the kickoff, Scotty barked at me about the snap, told his receivers the exact routes he wanted, and led us down the field to score. The quarter ended with us behind two points.

As we changed end zones for the last quarter, our place-kicker, Jeff Smith, stepped onto the field and stuck four fingers in the air. Our players on the sideline figured it out and joined him. Little Smitty peered at the Jackson Coach. He meant: "This is the fourth quarter, now you play our game."

Our hands went up on the field to join our teammates. We stared at the Jackson bench. We closed with two unanswered touchdowns.

Jocks tend to remember being a little better than they were. Accepting that, I was all over Jackson. The coaches passed out hustle stickers at Monday's Kangaroo Court. They called me up front 10 times. The next guy back earned six stickers.

Coach asked me to speak to end recognition. My face flushed as tears welled up. I declined with a headshake. Coach bailed me out with a, "Let's go, men!"

Telling teammates that I'd earned five stickers, and Jerry the other five, would've been too hard.

Confidence described us after Jackson. When the other team sucked air as the third quarter ended, we waved four fingers and hit harder in the fourth. We swamped Waverly, Meigs, and Athens by a

combined 128 to 10. Our attitudes said, "You don't have a chance!" to the guys in the wrong colored jerseys.

Then we watched Gallia's game films.

Like us, they absorbed an early league loss and ran the table after. Unlike us, they handled Ironton.

Gallia built a power game around a man named Brian Mink. He weighed 69 pounds more than me, and he would be in my face all night as nose guard and fullback for the Blue Devils. Coach Boynton said the Ohio High School Athletic Association engraved Mink's All-State plaque after his Ironton game. I wanted Mink badly! Saying so and convincing myself I believed it; let me bear up to the abuse I saw the animal hand out on game film.

Scotty defrosted 65 yards of field to start the game by making a quarterback draw go for a touchdown. Before we celebrated, Gallia manhandled us. We sulked and they capitalized. The halftime scoreboard said 16-12, them. We came out of the locker room flat. Gallia smacked us again to put us behind 22-12. We looked like quitters.

Mink toyed with me during the first part of the contest. Between squeals and grunts, he detailed the hurt he promised to deliver. If I blocked him at all, I used my speed to cut him, or his inertia to ride him out of the pocket. It made him furious. He didn't help me up after a good play; he stepped on me.

Midway through the third quarter, Gallia threatened deep in our territory. We would be down 17 points -- too many to overcome, even in our fourth quarter. Something needed to happen.

Mink took the ball on a fullback dive. I brought all 154 pounds to the line of scrimmage to meet him. He pancaked me. As he rumbled over, I reached up and grabbed his jersey. It stretched and I bobbed along for six yards before a planted foot wheeled the brute down.

The hometown announcer blurted, "Brian Mink for a six yard pick up... tackled by the entire Logan defense!"

Rage overwhelmed me. Tears streamed down my cheeks as we tried to collect ourselves in the defensive huddle to face Gallia's 4th down and 1. Right before we broke, a hush went over the place. A teammate whispered: "Jerry."

We stopped Gallia.

Our offense took over on the 25-yard line. Scotty fired off a pass, then another, then a long run by our halfback, and the heavens opened to a touchdown. Gallia limped through three plays and a fumbled punt snap. We scored again.

Mink tried to rally his team, but they were done. He folded, exhausted and humiliated. I remembered to help him up. We scored every time we touched the ball, and won 43-22.

One last game ended our season as we dismantled Wellston to be co-champions with Ironton. At our very lowest point, Ironton escaped with a one-touchdown victory. We crushed the team that beat them. We're still willing to play Ironton again to split our co-champions' title. I hope they feel the same way.

Nine months after high school football ended, I broke my neck in a car crash. I didn't wear seatbelts in 1977. The Logan Chieftains 1976 season is the movie I ran in my head to carry me through quadriplegia. I knew if I worked hard enough and refused to quit, I could win. Blessings, including college, law school, career, and family have added to the reel, but the picture always starts with the faces of my teammates, as kids, back when everybody called me Butch.

Chieftain Profile: Joe Howdysshell LHS Class of 2005

Joe Howdysshell was born a Chieftain.

The 2005 graduate died earlier this year following a 14-year battle against cancer. Joe was a champion on the football field and more importantly in the game of life.

Cancer did not define Joe before, during or after his diagnosis.

Joe came from a family of Chieftains. His grandfather, Paul Blosser, was one of the early standout athletes from Logan HS. His older brother, Jake, was a star fullback and linebacker on Logan's second ever playoff team.

Joe lived as a Chieftain.

He surrounded himself with friends who shared his passion. Those friends became teammates. And the bond they formed was beyond description. From Logan recreation sports to Comets, Tomahawks, and travel baseball and on to Logan high school teams, Joe was a fierce competitor and the ultimate teammate.

"I was lucky enough to know Joe beginning in grade school," said teammate and classmate Cole Resler. "And the friendship continued far beyond our football field playing days."

"Joe lived and died for his family," his brother Jake explained. "But a close second was his love for sports. He was never the biggest, or the fastest, but he loved being on the field with his teammates."

Joe played as a left tackle on Logan's 2004 Southeastern Ohio Athletic League championship football team, a season that was marked by resiliency. The team started 1-5, including a loss to rival Jackson, but reeled off four wins to close the season to capture a share of the league title with Gallipolis, who Logan crushed 43-13 away from home.

"Joe epitomized his position on the field – left tackle" Resler revealed. "Much of what Joe did, was unnoticed. However, if he didn't do his job, if he wasn't there, then you'd know quickly."

"Joe would do anything that was necessary for the team to be successful," another teammate and classmate, Justin Pack, remembered. "He had no issue being the scout team tight end, scout team center, whatever it took."

"Joe Howdysshell is the illustration of what we want our young Logan Chieftains to eventually become – a man of integrity, character, and charisma."

Joe was diagnosed with cancer. He underwent procedures and treatments. Like many who get diagnosed with cancer – he had ups and downs. But Joe continued to be involved with his family, his community, and of course his favorite sports teams.

"When he was diagnosed with cancer, it curtailed his on-field activity," his brother Jake recalled. "But he turned that energy into rooting for his favorite teams even more. He could rattle off stats about his beloved Buckeyes, Bengals, Reds, or Chieftains."

Joe died as a Chieftain.

"He was a proud former athlete and Chieftain fan forever," concluded his brother Jake.

Tradition

10. - *The Robert Dee Gabriel Memorial Color Guard.* They present the colors before each home game, a unique part of the Chieftain pre-game, and just another aspect that makes Football Fridays on the Hilltop special.

9. - *Tomahawk Award Stickers.* These stickers were first given out in the late-1960s. The decals have changed over time, but they decorate Chieftain helmets to this day.

8. - *Hitting the "WIN" sign as the team leaves the locker room.* The origin of the "WIN" sign is unknown, but every kid who walks into the locker room knows its importance. Even if you're walking out for gym class, it's hard not to put your fist on the sign.

7. - *The Pre-Game Pile Jump.* Following the run through "Tunnel 'L'," members of the Varsity football team form a mass of purple while the last couple of players, usually captains and seniors, jump on top of the pile to give final words of encouragement.

6. - *Singing the LHS Fight Song after every win.* Following every win, the Chieftains gather at mid-field to sing the LHS Fight Song. This is especially sweet after victories over rivals on the road or after clinching the SEOAL title at home.

5. - *Willie Dicken's "Touchdown, Logan."* Following every Logan touchdown, two famous words shout over the loudspeakers at Bill Sauer Field, *Touchdown, Logan!*

4. - *Fast Entrance. The Logan Marching Chieftains signature entrance.* One of the most unique spectacles in all of high school sports. Helps define Friday Nights on the Hilltop.

3. - *Victory Bell.* We're still researching the origins of the LHS Victory Bell that rings out following every Chieftain Victory. Following the singing of the LHS Fight Song, the boys sprint to the East Gates to let the sweet sound of victory ring!

2. - *Senior Walk.* Starting by the Seniors of 2001, following the final home game, all the seniors join arms and take one final walk across Bill Sauer Field. Although it is a new tradition, it's one that has grown quickly. It's a bitter sweet moment and a fitting end to a long journey.

1. - *Tunnel "L."* If you talk to current or former players, they'll tell you there is no bigger rush than running through the Logan Marching Chieftain's "Tunnel 'L'" just before kick-off. With thousands of fans on their feet, it's one of the loudest moments of the evening.
